

## NEA celebrates 6th NEAM

### 54 power coops rated as AAA

The National Electrification Administration (NEA) has rated 54 electric cooperatives (ECs) as AAA based on two rating criteria namely the Key Performance Standards (80%) and Electric Cooperatives Classification (20%). The KPS cover 32 financial, institutional, technical and reportorial compliances indicators and standards while EC Classification covers seven financially-driven standards and parameters including accounts payables to power suppliers and the transmission company.

Using the KPS and EC Classification, corresponding ratings were given to scores garnered by ECs, as follows: 95-100 = AAA; 90-94 = AA; 85-89 = A; 75-84 = B; 50-74 = C; and 49 and below = D.

Administrator Edita S. Bueno said, "NEA commends the ECs which garnered overall performance of AAA. May you be continually inspired to be better operationally and more responsive to the needs of your member-consumers."

Of the 54 ECs rated as AAA, 19 ECs scored 100 points. Meanwhile, 14 ECs were rated AA; 4 ECs rated A; 13 ECs rated B; 13 ECs rated C; and 10 ECs rated D.

On regional basis, Caraga Region performed well as all the seven ECs attained AAA rating.

"ECs registered with the Cooperative Development Authority (CDA) are not included in the evaluation and determination of overall performance ratings for 2014 to give them ample time to be fully integrated into the mainstream. Albay Electric Cooperative, Inc. (Aleco) and Pampanga II Electric Cooperative, Inc. (Pelco II), both of which entered in a Private Sector Participation are also excluded to give Concessionaire of Aleco and Investor-Manager of Pelco II an interim period within which to revitalize their respective operations," Administrator Bueno added.

This performance rating may serve as basis for entitlement to prescribed NEA Guidelines on Benefits, Allowances and Incentives of EC Officials and Employees, effective August 1, 2015.



From August 1 to 31, NEA celebrated the 6th National Electrification Awareness Month (NEAM). Various activities were undertaken to make the celebration meaningful. One of the highlights of the event was the 22nd NEA- EC Consultative Conference held on August 5 at the Manila Hotel. Some 1,216 participants from 115 electric cooperatives, NEA and other private institutions attended the said occasion. Some of the topics discussed included Best Practices of ECs like PENELCO, ROMELCO and DASURECO, Renewable Energy Initiatives, Values and Features of a Survey on EC Customers and Disaster Resiliency. Department of Energy (DOE) Officer-in-Charge Secretary Zenaida Monsada led more than 1,200 rural electrification partners in commending the NEA and

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## NEA, GCG Sign Performance Agreement Negotiation for 2016

To ensure that the advocacy of good governance in government is carried-out, a Performance Agreement Negotiation between the National Electrification Administration (NEA) and the Governance Commission on Government-Owned and Controlled Corporations (GCG) for 2016 was done on September 2, 2015 at the GCG Office in Makati City.

NEA's Strategy Map and 2016 Performance Scorecard were presented by the Administrator to GCG. After hours of negotiation, the two agencies reached an agreement which was signed by their respective officials.

Administrator Bueno said, "NEA is upbeat in accomplishing all its targets in 2016, the bulk of which includes the 100% electrification of the 32, 441 sitios under the government's Sitio Electrification Program (SEP). SEP is an integral

part of President Benigno S. Aquino III's social contract with the Filipino people. It is a program that has, so far, brought the benefits of electricity to 26,081 sitios and about 350,000 household connections or 1.75 million Filipinos in remote and far-flung areas of the country".

Department of Energy OIC-Secretary Zenaida Monsada and Assistant Secretary and NEA Board Alternate Chair Jose Raymond Acol lent their support by attending the 2016 Scorecard presentation.

Previously, Administrator Bueno formed a NEA Cluster on Corporate Governance to review, recommend and monitor

mechanisms for the operationalization and compliance of GCG's requirements; integrate relevant inter-department data in order to respond to the corporate governance requirements of oversight agencies and other stakeholders; and recommend and maintain program implementation, ensure the sustainability of the Agency's Performance Governance System (PGS) and continuously cascade the System to each Government Component Unit and other strategic alliances.

## SOLAR SUMMIT

NEA Administrator Edita Bueno emphasized at the 5th Philippine Solar Summit held last July 15 that the Agency, together with the ECs, is taking vigorous steps to accelerate household access to electricity.

Citing the Agency's policy framework which views rural electrification as a vital infrastructure as roads and bridges, Administrator Bueno said the combined efforts of the Agency and the ECs have already brought the country's energization level to 83% as of June this year, representing a 63.4% jump from its record in 1969.

Addressing an audience composed of investors and stakeholders engaged in the adoption and use of solar energy, she said in particular that the provisions of Republic Act 10531, otherwise known as the NEA Reform Act of 2013, vested NEA with powers to enforce institutional and governance standards to ECs and restructure them when needed, allowing the Agency to maintain performance standards for ECs and ultimately safeguard the interest of the member-consumers.

## SEMINAR ON RA 10531

In line with the thrust of the Agency to raise awareness on Republic Act 10531, otherwise known as the NEA Reform Act of 2013, a seminar on its Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) was held on July 13 and 28 at the HES Auditorium, NEA Building.

Attendees were 147 NEA employees grouped according to their own association.

The seminar covered key features of the IRR and the Philippine Government Electronic Procurement System (PhilGEPS), principles of public procurement, issues pertaining to EC registration with the Cooperative Development Authority (CDA) or the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), compensation for ECs in the event of relocation of distribution equipment,

NEA formulated KPS pursuant to Republic Act No. 9136. The performances of the ECs are measured by using financial, institutional and technical (FIT) performance indicators and standards. The guidelines on KPS was approved by the NEA Board of Administrators on 26 August 2011 under Board Resolution No. 27 and implemented under Memorandum No. 2014-020 to the ECs dated 31 August 2011.

Likewise, in response to RA No. 10531, NEA formulated six financial and operational standards and parameters to assess the performance of the ECs. The Guidelines for the Classification of ECs was approved by the NEA Board on 6 November 2013 under Board Resolution No. 1 and approved by the Department of Energy (DOE) on 12 December 2013.

To rate EC performance, NEA has adopted a color-coding scheme which identifies compliance status of an EC and the level of intervention it needs from the Agency.

The color-coding scheme is based on six financial parameters which include cash-general fund, collection efficiency, power accounts payable, profitability, net worth, and system loss.

To strengthen the ECs and increase their level of preparedness in view of the changing conditions of the environment and the power industry, she said various mechanisms are regularly put in place by the Agency, among them the Disaster Resiliency Program, in consultation with all the coops.

*“NEA is consistently stepping up efforts to make the ECs more responsive to the needs of the times. The key is to keep looking ahead, while remaining grounded with the demands of the present,”* she said.

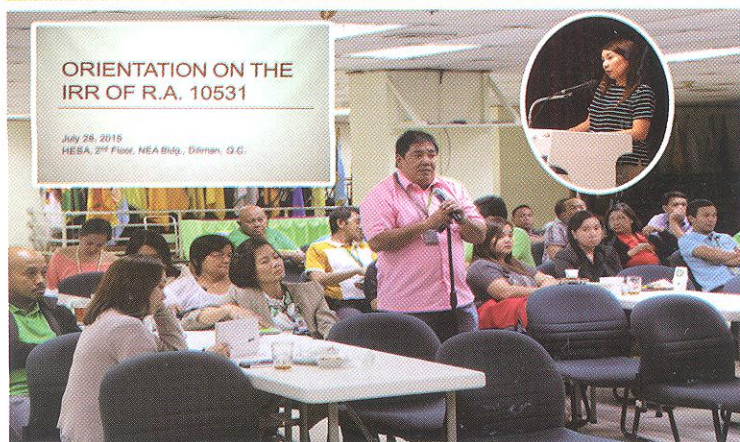

hydro power system in Dalupan to the distribution line and installing electrical connection in households identified by the B’laans in the community.

The power plant may likewise be integrated with the main grid under the Net Metering scheme, and is seen to boost livelihood development using renewable energy in the Davao region.

performance status of ECs, and scope of NEA’s jurisdiction over the coops.

NEA Administrator Edita Bueno said such seminars are important in ensuring that NEA employees, from top management down the line, are made knowledgeable about specific provisions of the law and its implications on the operations of the Agency and the ECs.

*“All of us have to be on the same page when asked about RA 10531 and its IRR. We are accountable for every piece of information we give the ECs and the public,”* she added.

**Inauguration and Blessing of Media Lounge**

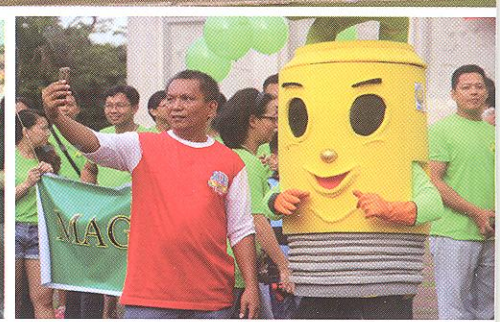

## NEA joins hands with Batelec I in tree planting activity

In a bid to mitigate erosion problems of the Pansipit River located in the province of Batangas, NEA joined hands with Batelec I in planting a total of 1,500 seedlings along its river bank last August 18.

According to the Community Environment and Natural Resources Office, the unit responsible for implementing and enforcing the programs and policies of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) on the community level, the Pansipit River needs to be conserved, especially as it serves as an important passageway for the endemic maliputo fish to exit from the Balayan Bay and breed in the Taal Lake.

The river, traversing the towns of Agoncillo, Lemery, San Nicolas, and Taal, was declared a protected area in 1996 through the National Integrated Protected Areas System Act.

During the opening ceremony, CENRO-Calaca has likewise signed with Batelec I a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) which formalizes turn-over of management, conservation, and protection of the three-hectare Pansipit River Plantation from former to the latter.

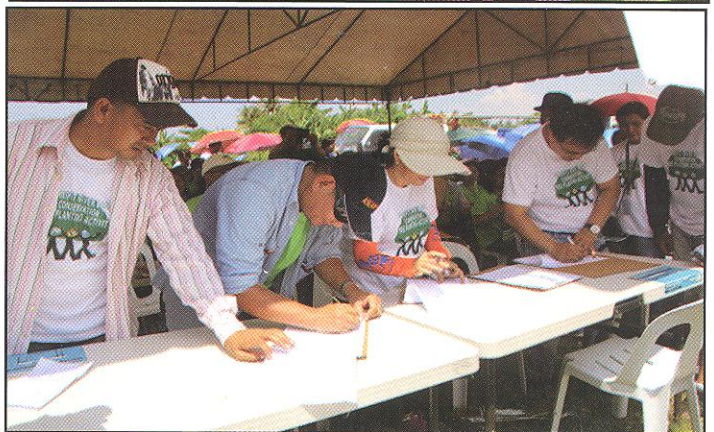
The MOA states that the coop will have responsibility to “conserve existing vegetation both man-made and natural and promote conservation of biodiversity” of the areas along the Pansipit Riverbank and “ensure at least 85% survival rate” of the plantation.

For their part, NEA officials including Deputy Administrator (DA) Edgardo Piamonte, DA Sonia San Diego, and Acting DA Atty. Rossan Rosero-Lee expressed high hopes that the tree planting would be a sign of the combined commitment of the Agency and its partner ECs to protect the environment and support the goals of the National Greening Program.

“This activity indicates clearly our resolve to help our local community in ways other than providing quality and efficient power distribution to our member-consumers. Sana maipagpatuloy pa natin ang mga ganitong programa upang mapag-ibayo pa ang pangangalaga natin sa ating kalikasan,” DA Piamonte said.

A total of 139 NEA officials, employees, and support staff participated in this year’s tree planting activity.

Joining them were employees from the Batelec I Main Office and Lemery Area Office led by OIC Engr. Alvin Velasco and Project Supervisor Orlando Andres.





## NEWS AROUND THE ECs

### MORESCO I is 100% Philippine Distribution Code Compliant

The pioneer electric cooperative continues to be a pioneer in operational and service excellence.

The Misamis Oriental I Rural Electric Service, Inc. (Moresco I) was declared as 100% Philippine Distribution Code compliant, the first among the 119 electric cooperatives nationwide, by the Philippine Distribution Management Committee on July 30, 2015 after passing assessment and inspection according to a press statement made by the electric cooperative (EC).

General Manager Julie B. Real said, *“The experience felt by the Moresco I workforce was simply overwhelming upon the declaration of the Distribution Management Committee that we are compliant”*.

Administrator Edita S. Bueno, meanwhile, said, *“NEA is proud to congratulate Moresco I for this new milestone accomplishment. Truly, you are a torchbearer among your peers, an inspiration worth emulating. May you continue to be resolutely committed, determinedly hardworking and solidly coordinated as a team to serve better your member-consumers”*.

As a distribution utility, Moresco I is mandated by law to comply with the Philippine Distribution Code (PDC) rules and procedures set by the Distribution Management Committee (DMC). DMC

was established by the Energy Regulatory Commission (ERC) as mandated in Section 1.3 of the Distribution Code under Republic Act No. 9136 otherwise known as the Electric Power Industry Reform Act (EPIRA) of 2001. For the PDC, its creation covers the following: establish a monitoring system; ensure the compliance of the distribution utilities (DUs); promote accountability of the DUs to achieve greater operational and economic efficiency; and protect the public interest.

Only two other distribution utilities in the country have been declared by DMC as 100% compliant, the both privately-run Visayan Electric Company and Davao Light & Power Company.

Moresco I, incorporated and registered with NEA on May 21, 1971, was one of NEA's two pilot ECs. It is among the consistent best performing ECs and has been among the first recipients of Diamond Electric Cooperative Award for exemplary performance in all aspects of operation in 2010. As of July 30, 2015, Moresco I has electrified the City of El Salvador and nine municipalities of Misamis Oriental, 155 barangays, 1,214 sitios and serving 81,288 connections.

### 90 households in Davao Occidental benefit from electricity access

Around 90 households in Barangay Dalupan in Don Marcelino, Davao Occidental are expected to benefit from electricity access following the inauguration of the Dalupan Micro-hydro Power Plant last July 29.

The 25-kW power plant will serve a total of about 450 residents living in the isolated sitios of Kiaga, Banag, Miago, and Cunalom in Dalupan, and will support the goal of the government to increase access to energy in the rural areas of Mindanao.

NEA Deputy Administrator for Electric Distribution Utilities Services Edgardo Piamonte, who was present during the inauguration, said the project is an affirmation of the Agency's resolve to light up all the sitios in the country, not only as adherence to its corporate mandate, but more importantly as an earnest gesture of hope-giving to the rural Filipinos.

*“The unwritten mandate of NEA is to give hope to our fellowmen, most especially the marginalized populace,”* he said.

*“By providing them electricity, we are also leveraging the fight against poverty and the prolonged inaccessibility of our people to socioeconomic opportunities,”* he added.

## Elementary, Secondary Schools as SEP/BLEP beneficiaries

The National Electrification Administration signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Education (DepEd) for the electrification of schools in areas covered by the Sitio Electrification Program (SEP) and the Barangay Line Enhancement Program (BLEP) of the government.

NEA was among the signatories to the DepEd's LightEd PH Project, School Electrification Program – One Child, One Lamp during the project launch at the Bulwagan ng Karunungan, DepEd Complex, Meralco Avenue, Pasig City on July 31, 2015.

DepEd Secretary Bro. Armin A. Luistro, FSC led the MOU ceremony. Administrator Edita S. Bueno represented NEA together with Deputy Administrator Edgardo R. Piamonte of the Electric Distribution Utilities Services.

Based on the Enhanced Basic Education Information System SY 2013-2014, there were 5,954 elementary and high schools without electricity. The total number of enrollees of these schools total to 1.101million. Majority of these schools are situated in the area coverage of the electric cooperatives, NEA's partners in the implementation of BLEP and SEP.

Under the MOU, NEA shall mobilize the ECs and their networks to identify schools where access to power lines may be made available; provide power

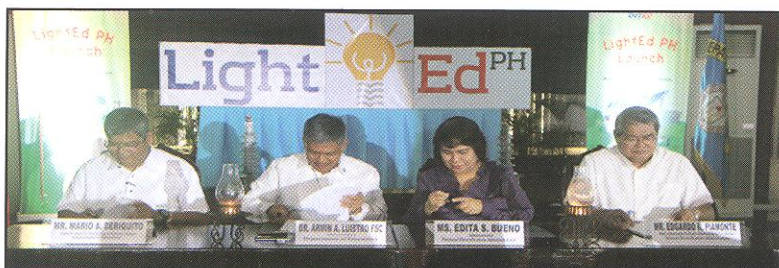

lines up to the service drop in the school premises through the ECs; provide policy guidance and directions to ensure proper implementation and completion of the project; render periodic report/ updates on the implementation of the project to DepEd as deemed necessary; and provide assistance to DepEd in requesting additional funding in areas that may not be covered by BLEP and SEP.

Meanwhile, DepEd shall provide the list of public elementary and secondary schools that are bereft of access to electricity; assist in the implementation and monitoring of progress of electrification by ensuring cooperation of beneficiary schools and division/regional offices; ensure that installation of electrical wiring in school must conform with the Philippine Electrical Code; and request additional funding in areas that may not be covered by BLEP and SEP.

Administrator Bueno said, "Congratulations to Secretary Luistro and the DepEd for pushing for a project that strikes the heart of the Filipino child, that is giving electricity to every SEP
